

Youth Speaks

Taylor Mali (Friday Night Speaker)

A poet, teacher, and playwright, Taylor Mali is a four-time National Poetry Slam champion. Mali recently showcased his new one-man show, *Teacher Teacher* for NBC, and at the HBO Comedy Arts Festival in Aspen where he won the Jury Prize for Best One Person Performance. He was one of the original poets on HBO's *Russell Simmons Presents Def Poetry*.

Mali is no stranger to the theatre. He put his theatrical ambitions on hold to pursue a career in poetry "because that's where the real money is." But he won't be halfway through his first outrageously dynamic poem before you realize that this classically trained, Shakespearian actor has taken a lot of theatre with him. A seventh-generation New Yorker, Mali is an Oxford-educated actor with an M.A. in English literature who until recently put those skills to use teaching math to sixth graders at a private school in Manhattan. "There is a poetry in numbers unlike any that can be found in words," he says.

In addition to his live spoken word performances, Mali recently released What Learning Leaves (Hanover Press) and two CDs entitled Poems From the Like Free Zone and The Difference Between Left and Wrong. He was one of the principal subjects in Paul Devlin's 1997 documentary SlamNation.

Derrick Jensen (Sunday Morning Speaker)

Hailed as the philosopher poet of the ecology movement, Derrick Jensen is the widely acclaimed author of *Endgame*, *A Language Older Than Words*, *The Culture of Make Believe* (a finalist for the 2003 J. Anthony

Lukas Book Prize), and Walking on Water, among many others. Jensen's writing has been described as "breaking and mending the reader's heart" (Publishers Weekly). Author, teacher, activist, small farmer, and leading voice of uncompromising dissent, he regularly stirs auditoriums across the country with revolutionary spirit. Jensen holds a degree in creative writing from Eastern Washington University, a degree in mineral engineering physics from the Colorado School of Mines, and has taught at Eastern Washington University and Pelican Bay State Prison. He lives in Crescent City, California.

Youth Speaks (Saturday Night Around the Hearth)

Founded in 1996 in San Francisco, Youth Speaks is at the forefront of a national Spoken Word performance, education, and youth development movement. In the Bay Area, over 40,000 young people use this powerful medium to communicate directly with their peers. Politically aware, critically engaged, and unafraid to speak, they are picking up the pen and grabbing hold of the microphone, moving themselves into positions of power – claiming voice when they've been voiceless, and access where they've been sidelined.

Youth Speaks strives to shift the perceptions of youth by combating illiteracy, alienation, and silence. A global movement of brave new voices brings the noise from the margins to the core. Empowering the next generation of leaders, self-defined artists, and visionary activists through written and oral literacies, we challenge youth to find, develop, publicly present, and apply their voices as creators of social change.


