THE CONFERENCE PROGRAM



Each participant joins a single discussion group for the weekend. Each group includes one or more resource people, who share their experiences and musings with the group. Participants should expect to engage themselves, offering their own thoughts, questions, and experiences. It is not unusual for small groups to continue their efforts beyond Asilomar.

Participants also attend general sessions at which distinguished speakers offer insights about English education—personal views, new developments, and fresh evaluations. Our speakers this year are

ELDONNA EVERTTS — Teacher, professor, researcher, and Assistant Executive Secretary of NCTE are a few of the titles earned by Dr. Eldonna Evertts. Her contribution to professional journals, including Elementary English, and her leadership in conferences, institutes, and The Nebraska Project English Center have already made her well known to CCCTE. It is her long study of the language development of children on which we will call, however, for her presentation to the Friday night general session. NOAM CHOMSKY-English teachers greet the name of Dr. Noam Chomsky with appreciation and respect. The opportunity to hear and meet one of the great pioneers in English language study gives special significance to Asilomar XVI. Regularly a professor in the Department of Modern Languages at M.I.T., Dr. Chomsky is a research fellow at Harvard in 1965-66 and will be in residence in 1966-67 at the University of California at Berkeley. From the publication of Syntactic Structures in 1957 to Aspects of the Theory of Syntax in 1965, Dr. Chomsky has had an ever deepening impact on language study. He will share some insights and concerns with us on Saturday afternoon.

NEVITT SANFORD - Those concerned with the changing nature of the American college student are familiar with the work of Dr. Nevitt Sanford. Since the publication of The American College in 1961, the work of Dr. Sanford and his colleagues at The Institute for the Study of Human Problems (Stanford University) has received widespread attention. Their recent study of students at Stanford and U.C., Berkeley, was reported in the **Phi Delta Kappan** (April 1966). Also co-author of **The Authori**tarian Personality (1950), Dr. Sanford has interests in both psychology and education. On Sunday morning he will discuss changes in student attitudes and objectives.

Participants enjoy professional and social comradeship. Open sharing of human concerns amid the natural beauties of the Monterey Peninsula set the conditions for renewal. An informal reception for all participants Saturday afternoon at the Mark Thomas Inn and an open Saturday evening provide an additional place and time.

- (b) Compensatory education programs now in effect: their nature, methods of implementation, innovations, and evaluation

- (d) The learning process and behavioral change

Pre-registration Information

1. Registration for Asilomar Sixteen

You may pre-register now by paying the full conference fee or by paying a \$5.00 deposit. After August 19, you must send the full fee. Balances on fees must be paid by September 9, 1966.

A registration may not be cancelled, but it may be transferred.

The conference fee, which includes five meals, varies with the type of accommodation: Longhouse (double), \$21; Longhouse (single), \$25; Shore View (double), \$22; Shore View (single), \$26; Guest Inn (double), \$24.50; Guest Inn (single), \$28.50; Hotels, \$26.50; Surf and Sand and Sea Galaxy (four to a room), \$31. The number of reservations in each type of accommodation is limited; therefore reservations are accepted on a first-come-first-served basis.

No off-grounds reservations will be accepted, except from teachers from Monterey County, until all Asilomar spaces are filled. The off-grounds fee (\$9) includes registration and grounds fees; tickets for meals may be purchased at the Administration Building.

No reservations will be taken at the conference.
