1. Registration for Asilomar Seventeen

You may pre-register now by paying the full conference fee or by paying a \$5.00 deposit. After August 18, you must send the full fee. Balances on fees must be paid by September 11, 1967.

A registration may not be cancelled, but it may be transferred.

The conference fee, which includes five meals, varies with the type of accommodation: Longhouse (double), \$21; Longhouse (single), \$25; Long View (double), \$22; Long View (single), \$26; Guest Inn (double), \$24.50; Guest Inn (single), \$28.50; Hotels, \$26.50; Surf and Sand and Sea Galaxy (four to a room), \$31. The number of reservations in each type of accommodation is limited; therefore reservations are accepted on a first-come-first-served basis.

No off-grounds reservations will be accepted, except from teachers from Monterey County, until all Asilomar spaces are filled. The off-grounds fee (\$9) includes registration and grounds fees; tickets for meals may be purchased at the Administration Building.

No reservations will be taken at the conference.
