This year we turn aside from tradition, offering an Asilomar Conference without a theme expressed in words such as change, challenge, or revolution. Perhaps never before have prophetic themes been easier to invent, for this has been a year of increasing polemics, leaving each of us somewhat strained from an almost characteristic contentiousness in our educational and political worlds. At a time when almost everyone has become a rhetorician, declaiming his attitude toward one manifestation of frustration and unrest after another, let our reticence about adding more inflated words and exhortations be a message of its own. Our silence here at least diminishes by one the daily prophecies we hear. To those who need a theme we say invent your own.

The Conference Program

The program begins with dinner at 6:30 p.m., Friday, September 27, 1968, and ends with lunch on Sunday, September 29, 1968. Each participant joins a single discussion group of his choice, meeting briefly Friday evening, and then continuing with meetings Saturday and Sunday. Partici-

pants should engage themselves in the discussion, exploring ideas which interest the group, and offering their own thoughts, questions, and experiences.

The program also includes three general sessions: on Friday evening, a showing of art films; on Saturday afternoon and Sunday morning, speakers.

FEATURED SPEAKER

DR. WAYNE C. BOOTH, Dean of the General College, University of Chicago, former Department Chairman of English at Earlham College, and author of "The Rhetoric of Fiction," a landmark of current literary exploration.

STUDY SESSIONS

Pre-registration Information

1. Registration for Asilomar Eighteen

You may pre-register now by paying the full conference fee or by paying a \$5.00 deposit. After August 19, you must send the full fee. Balances on fees must be paid by September 8, 1968.

A registration may not be cancelled, but it may be transferred.

The conference fee, which includes five meals, varies with the type of accommodation: Longhouse (double), \$21; Longhouse (single), \$25; Long View (double), \$23; Long View (single), \$27; Guest Inn (double), \$24; Guest Inn (single), \$28; Hotels (double), \$26, (single), \$30; View Crescent (double), \$30, (single), \$40; Surf and Sand and Sea Galaxy (four to a room), \$31. The number of reservations in each type of accommodation is limited; therefore reservations are accepted on a first-come-first-served basis.

No off-grounds reservations will be accepted, except from teachers from Monterey County, until all Asilomar spaces are filled. The off-grounds fee (\$9) includes registration and grounds fees; tickets for meals may be purchased at the Administration Building.

No reservations will be taken at the conference.
